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- 7 Acomb
No returns made from part of Dringhouses or Knapton both of which are in the parish of Acomb from the difficulty of procuring them.
- 24 Askham Bryan
About a fifth or sixth part of the 227 acres denominated wheat is maslin. Beans and peas often grow mixed together.
- 45 Bilbrough
Perhaps about a fifth or sixth part of the 156 acres of wheat is maslin. Beans and peas are mixed together.
- 48 Bilton
In our neighbourhood this year the crops of all kinds of grain have in general been great and abundant. Oats perhaps may be said to be the best crop and wheat the worst. With regard to wheat there was a pretty full crop of straw upon the ground, but in many places it was rather light in the ear and the grain small. I have joined peas and beans together; there are some crops of clean beans, but peas are never sown alone here. Potatoes are not much cultivated in this parish, but the produce of what has been planted this season, has seldom been exceeded either in quantity or quality.
- 62 Bolton Percy
The crops of every description have, in general, been very good throughout the whole of this parish. I learn by inquiry from the millers in this district that the wheat of this last harvest, now in use, produces, when ground, an unusual quantity of flour. Wheat and oats have been very productive. Barley is considered as a fair average crop; potatoes are sold very cheap, the quantity exceeding any known in former years. I believe this to be accurate.
- 473 St Olave's
N.B. the inhabitants of Rawcliffe, one of the 4 united parishes, refuse to make any return, as there is no act of Parliament to compel them. (Editor's note: there is a breakdown of the acreages under the different crops for the individual farms.)

419 Thorp Arch

The produce of wheat in this parish this year on an average, is 10 stooks to the quarter. N.B. a stook is a provincial term, signifying 12 sheaves. Barley 11 stooks to the quarter, oats 9, peas and beans 4. N.B. no peas sown here separate from the beans. No rape sown this year. This parish is strong stiff land. Rye is seldom or never sown here. N.B. the large farms in the parish are far less productive than the small ones.

438 Walton

Rye, none except a little sown amongst some of the wheat.
